Clipper Work

Clipper mastery is at the centre of barbering.

Key Techniques:

- Clipper-over-comb - Controls weight and removes bulk with precision.
- Freehand clippers - Used for shaping close cuts, afros, flat tops, and beards.
- Using guards/attachments - Ensures consistent length during fades and tapers.
- Clipper fading - Blending different lengths smoothly using guard progression.
- Reverse fading - Working from longer to shorter to refine transitions.

Why it matters:

Clipper skill determines the sharpness, balance, and overall structure of a barbered haircut.

Scissor (Shear) Techniques

Barbers use scissors for shape control and refined work.

Core Techniques:

- Scissor-over-comb
 - Classic barbering technique for clean, tailored cuts.
- Point cutting
 - Softens lines and adds texture to tops and fringes.
- Blunt cutting
 - Creates strong outlines and structured shapes.
- Slide cutting
 - Removes weight for natural movement in longer styles.

Why it matters:

Scissor control improves precision and allows for custom detailing on any hair length.

Fading & Blending

Fading is one of the most essential barbering abilities.

Levels of Fades:

- Low fade
- Mid fade
- High fade
- Skin/bald fade
- Drop fade

Techniques Involved:

- Guard progression
- Lever control (open, half, closed)
- Stepping and scooping motions
- Refining with clipper-over-comb or trimmers

Why it matters:

A seamless fade defines modern barbering craftsmanship.

Tapers & Line-Ups

Tapers offer subtle graduation; line-ups create strong, sharp outlines.

Techniques:

- Precise trimmer work
- Tight cornering and edging
- Balancing and symmetry checks
- Controlled removal around ears and neckline
